**9.2.1 Proposals for New and Amended Undergraduate Courses****9.2.1.1 Faculty of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources****(1) Bachelor of Environmental Systems***pages D9-D16*

The Faculty of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources is proposing to introduce a new award course, the Bachelor of Environmental Systems. This applied science course is being introduced to service the demand for technically proficient graduates capable of tackling catchment and regional-scale environmental issues. In particular, the course will prepare graduates for the critical challenges of measuring and managing carbon and water in the Australian environment, whilst ensuring sustainable food production.

At its meeting of 18 March 2009, the Committee considered and rejected (by majority vote) the proposal from the Faculty of Science and the Faculty of Arts to amend the Bachelor of Science/Bachelor of Arts combined degree. A revised proposal document has now been submitted. The main purpose of the proposal is to reduce the overall length of the combined degree from five to four years, thus creating a course which will replace the recently deleted Bachelor of Liberal Studies.

The Sydney Conservatorium of Music has submitted two reports regarding amendments to the units of study in the Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Music Studies and Bachelor of Music Studies/Bachelor of Arts.

The Sydney Conservatorium of Music has submitted a report regarding an amendment to units of study in the Bachelor of Music (Music Education). As ICT is a mandated area for NSW Institute of Teachers accreditation, those preparing to be teachers need a learning and teaching focus when studying music technology. By providing Music Education students with a separate technology UOS (as in the old degree), the Conservatorium can better cater for the needs of these students in the area of ICT and music technology. The proposed change also includes amendments to the total credit points to be undertaken in the areas of Teaching Music/Music Education and Music Skills.

The Sydney Conservatorium of Music has submitted reports regarding amendments to units of study in the Bachelor of Music (Jazz Performance) and consequent amendments to the degree structure. Jazz Improvisation is a large part of training within the Jazz Studies degree, and has always been an inclusive element of Principal Study. Current workload for jazz students in Principal Study is over 6 hours/week, this includes one-to-one lessons, concert practice, sectional tutorials and improvisation classes. In recognition of a more realistic student workload within these Principal Study units, the Faculty proposes to remove the 2 hour improvisation class from them and introduce a separate three-credit point Improvisation unit per semester as a co-requisite of Principal Study. This will also result in students being able to refer to more detailed results in their transcripts, and better management of teaching resources across the Faculty.

## **Amendment to Resolutions of Senate**

2.1 To qualify for the award of the degree at pass level students must:

2.1.1 complete successfully units of study giving credit for a total of 192 credit points; and

2.1.2 satisfy the requirements of all other By-laws, Rules and Resolutions of the University.

### **3. Requirements for the Bachelor of Environmental Systems degree at pass level**

3.1 To qualify for the award of the Bachelor of Environmental Systems a student must:

3.1.1 complete successfully units of study giving credit for a total of 144 credit points; and

3.1.2 satisfy the requirements of all other relevant By-laws, Rules and resolutions of the University.

### **4. Requirements Bachelor of Agricultural Economics, Bachelor of Resource Economics, and Bachelor of Science in Agriculture at honours level**

4.1 To qualify for the award of the degree at honours level, students must complete the pass level requirements at the honours level published in the Faculty Resolutions relating to the course.

## Amendment to Resolutions of Faculty

### Undergraduate degrees in the Faculty of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources

The Resolutions of Senate relating to the undergraduate degrees in the Faculty of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources are amended, with effect from 1 January 2010, as follows (additions indicated by underlined, deletions indicated by strikethrough):

#### 1. Admission

1.1 All applications for admission to candidature to an undergraduate degree or combined undergraduate degree in the Faculty of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources will be subject to the Undergraduate Admissions policy of the University of Sydney.

1.2 A candidate for the Bachelor of Agricultural Economics, Bachelor of Resource Economics, Bachelor of Science in Agriculture and Bachelor of Environmental Systems degrees in any stream may apply to the Dean for permission to transfer candidature to any other stream.

#### 2. Units of study

2.1 The units of study for the Bachelor of Agricultural Economics, Bachelor of Resource Economics, Bachelor of Science in Agriculture and Bachelor of Environmental Systems are set out under the subject areas tables in Chapter 4, together with:

2.1.1 credit point values

2.1.2 assumed knowledge, corequisites and prerequisites

2.1.3 the semesters in which they are offered

2.1.4 the units of study with which they are mutually exclusive

2.2 A student who enrolls, in accordance with these resolutions, in a unit or units of study prescribed for a degree other than the Bachelor of Agricultural Economics, Bachelor of Resource Economics, Bachelor of Science in Agriculture and Bachelor of Environmental Systems, shall satisfy the prerequisites, corequisites and other requirements prescribed for such units of study.

#### 3. Requirements for the pass degree

3.1 To qualify for a the degrees of Bachelor of Agricultural Economics, Bachelor of Resource Economics or Bachelor of Science in Agriculture, candidates must complete units of study making a total of 192 credit points and Professional Experience specified for individual degree courses. In a full-time program the normal load will be 48 credit points in each year for four years. The degree program must be completed within 10 calendar years of the first enrolment or re-admission without credit. If a candidate is admitted or re-admitted with credit, the faculty will determine a reduced time limit for completion of the degree.

3.2 To qualify for the degree of Bachelor of Environmental Systems, candidates must complete units of study making a total of 144 credit points In a full-time program the normal load will be 48 credit points in each year for three years. The degree program must be completed within 10 calendar years of the first enrolment or re-admission without credit. If a candidate is admitted or re-admitted with credit, the faculty will determine a reduced time limit for completion of the degree.

3.3. Candidates for the degrees of Bachelor of Agricultural Economics, ~~Bachelor of Horticultural Science, Bachelor of Land and Water Science,~~ Bachelor of Resource Economics, and Bachelor of Science in Agriculture and Bachelor of Environmental Systems shall complete the units of study listed for each degree in the faculty handbook.

#### 4. Restrictions on units

4.1 A candidate may choose elective units of study for which there is no prerequisite unit of study or for which the prerequisite/corequisite has been satisfied, provided that the timetable permits attendance at all scheduled classes.

4.2 Variations permitted to the requirements specified in Resolutions 1 and 2 include:

4.3 *Talented students*

4.3.1 Some variation in units of study required for completion of the degree may be approved by the Dean for exceptionally talented students.

4.4 *Summer School*

4.4.1 Units of study completed at the University of Sydney Summer School which correspond to units of study listed for the undergraduate degrees in the faculty handbook may be credited towards the course requirements.

#### 4.5 *Cross-institutional enrolment*

4.5.1 Provided that permission has been obtained in advance, the Dean may permit a student to complete a unit of study at another institution and have that unit credited to his/her course requirements provided that either:

4.5.1.1 the unit of study content is material not taught in any corresponding unit of study in the University, or

4.5.1.2 the student is unable for good reason to attend a corresponding unit of study at the University.

#### 4.6 *Additional units*

4.6.1 A student may enrol in units of study additional to the requirements in an academic year, only with the permission of the Dean.

#### 4.7 *Timetable clashes*

4.7.1 A student must obtain written permission of the Discipline Leader(s) concerned, and the permission of the Dean, all of whom may impose conditions of attendance, to enrol in units of study which have timetable clashes.

#### 4.8 *Restriction on enrolment*

4.8.1 A student must obtain the written permission of the Dean to enrol in level 3000 units of study unless he/she has successfully completed all required level 1000 units of study and has successfully completed or is concurrently enrolled in compulsory level 2000 units of study.

#### 4.9 *Credit transfer*

4.9.1 Graduates or students in other faculties or other degrees within the faculty or of other institutions who are admitted to candidature for the degree of bachelor in the faculty may be granted credit for units of study required for the various degrees of the faculty as specified in Resolution 2, as the Dean on behalf of the Faculty may determine, up to a maximum value of 96 credit points.

4.9.2 The Dean may approve credit for a maximum of 36 unspecified credit points for units of study successfully completed elsewhere, but not comparable to units listed in Resolution 2, as part of the 96 credit point maximum credit transfer permitted.

### **Faculty rules**

#### **5. Assessment policy**

5.1 Assessment methods for units of study offered in the faculty will be included in unit details in the faculty handbook and made available to students enrolled in the units at the beginning of the semester.

#### 5.2 *Examinations*

##### 5.2.1 Completion of unit of study

5.2.1.1 A student who has been absent from more than 10 percent of classes in a unit may be deemed to have failed to complete the requirements specified by the faculty for the unit and may be excluded by the Dean from admission to examinations in that unit.

##### 5.2.2 Further testing

5.2.2.1 A Discipline Leader may arrange for further testing of students in addition to scheduled assessments and examinations, in accordance with Academic Board policy.

5.2.2.2 Further tests may be awarded where the candidate has been prevented by sufficient and duly certified illness or misadventure from completing the assessment for a unit of study. The full range of common result grades is available for these candidates.

5.2.2.3 Further tests may be awarded in a unit of study where the examiner requires further evidence to reach a final assessment of a candidate who has failed a unit of study and whose performance is borderline (e.g. a final mark in the range 45–49 percent). The highest grade of award available is Pass.

5.2.2.4 Where possible and practicable, all further tests will be administered and results finalised no later than two weeks after the end of the examination period.

5.2.2.5 The Discipline Leader is responsible for the awarding, timetabling and conduct of further tests, which may take such form as the Discipline Leader directs. Students in a unit of

study must be given notice of the proposed date for conducting further tests no later than the date of publication of the final University examinations timetable.

5.2.2.6 Individual students granted a further test should wherever possible be given at least three days prior notice. A candidate who is absent from a further test without sufficient reason will be deemed to have failed the test.

5.2.2.7 In respect to the notification of students referred to above, students will be deemed to have been notified by the Discipline Leader as a result of the posting of information by the due date on one or more noticeboards as advised by the Discipline Leader concerned and posting an email to the student/s official University email address.

5.2.2.8 It is the responsibility of the student to provide written evidence of illness or misadventure to the appropriate Discipline Leader as soon as possible and practicable and in any case before the close of the relevant examination period. Where such evidence is not presented in time for the student to be offered a further test on the advertised date, the evidence will only be considered by the Discipline Leader where there is sufficient reason why it has not been presented by that date.

## **6. Honours and University Medal**

6.1 First Class or Second Class Honours, Division One or Division Two may be awarded at graduation.

6.2 First Class Honours candidates whose work is of sufficient merit, in the opinion of the Faculty Committee to Award Prizes, Honours and the University Medal, shall receive a bronze medal.

6.3 Award of honours at graduation

6.3.1 Honours are awarded in Agriculture and not in an individual subject.

6.3.2 Details of the fourth year work and determination of marks for fourth year are the responsibility of the Discipline Leader and sections concerned.

6.3.3.1 All candidates who have completed an independent research project as part of the final year degree program are formally eligible to be considered for honours.

6.3.3.2 Except with the special permission of the faculty, honours shall not be awarded to any candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Agricultural Economics, ~~Bachelor of Horticultural Science, Bachelor of Land and Water Science~~, Bachelor of Resource Economics or Bachelor of Science in Agriculture unless the candidate has completed the course in the minimum time (defined as four years for full-time students and up to 16 semesters for part-time students, pro-rated for any full-time study within the candidature).

6.3.3.3 Notwithstanding the previous condition, candidates who complete the first three years of the course in four years, and who by virtue of their weighted average marks would otherwise qualify for the award of honours, will be so considered.

6.3.3.4 Such candidates may however be disadvantaged in terms of honours grading and ranking.

For the Bachelor of Agricultural Economics and Bachelor of Resource Economics:

6.3.4.1 For the assessment of an aggregate mark for the award of honours at the end of the fourth year:

6.3.4.1.1 Each of the units of study at level 2 and level 3 provided for in the resolutions shall be weighted according to credit point value and a weighted average mark (WAM) obtained.

6.3.4.1.2 Each of the units of study at level 4 provided for in the resolutions shall be weighted according to credit point value and a weighted average mark (WAM) obtained.

6.3.4.1.3 The overall aggregate honours mark shall be the average of the level 2/3 WAM and the level 4 WAM.

For the ~~Bachelor of Horticultural Science, Bachelor of Land and Water Science~~ and Bachelor of Science in Agriculture:

6.3.4.2 For the determination of the overall honours mark for the award of honours at the end of the fourth year:

6.3.4.2.1 Each of the units of study provided for in the resolutions in second and third years shall be weighted according to credit point value and a weighted average mark (WAM) obtained.

6.3.4.2.2 The overall honours mark shall be the average of the second and third year WAM and the fourth year mark.

6.3.5 In computing the aggregate marks of students, the mark achieved on the occasion of the first attempt at a unit of study shall be the mark used.

For the Bachelor of Agricultural Economics and Bachelor of Resource Economics:

6.3.6 For the award of a particular level of honours a candidate, except in special circumstances, must obtain the relevant minimum aggregate honours mark and the minimum WAM in second and third year units of study set out in the following table:

Level of honours	Minimum overall honours mark	Minimum WAM Years 2/3
First Class	75	70
Second Class, Division 1	70	65
Second Class, Division 2	65	62

For the ~~Bachelor of Horticultural Science, Bachelor of Land and Water Science~~ Bachelor of Science in Agriculture:

6.3.6.2 For the award of a particular level of honours, a candidate, except in special circumstances, must obtain the relevant minimum marks as set out in the following table:

Level of honours	Minimum overall honours mark	Minimum WAM Years 2/3
First Class	75	70
Second Class, Division 1	70	65
Second Class, Division 2	65	60

6.3.6.3 In the event of a recommendation for the award of honours that departs from these standards, it shall be incumbent upon the Discipline Leader and section concerned to make out a substantial case for such a departure.

6.3.6.4 Admissible grounds for departure would include medical disability or misadventure early in the course, and the existence of consistently lower standards of grading in units of study undertaken outside the Faculty of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources.

6.3.7 The Committee to Award Prizes, Honours and the University Medal shall be responsible for the award of the university medal and the award of honours. Achievement of the minimum standards referred to elsewhere in these resolutions is not in itself sufficient justification for these awards.

6.3.7.1 For the Bachelor of Agricultural Economics and Bachelor of Resource Economics, a university medal may be awarded, on the recommendation of the Agricultural and Resource Economics Discipline Leader, to a student who has a Level 4 WAM of at least 85, an aggregate honours mark of at least 80 and a Second/Third Year WAM of at least 80.

6.3.7.2 For the ~~Bachelor of Horticultural Science, Bachelor of Land and Water Science~~ and Bachelor of Science in Agriculture, a university medal may be awarded, on the recommendation of the Sciences Discipline Leader, to a student who has a Level 4 WAM of at least 85, an overall honours mark of at least 80 and a Second/Third Year WAM of at least 80.

## **7. Suspension, withdrawal and discontinuation, re-enrolment and satisfactory progress**

### *7.1 Suspension of candidature*

7.1.1 A student, who has enrolled for the degree and who wishes to suspend candidature for more than two semesters, must seek approval of the Dean, who, where appropriate, may consult Discipline Leaders concerned and having considered advice, may determine any conditions for re-enrolment.

7.1.2 A student, who has not obtained written permission to suspend candidature for more than two semesters, will be required to apply for re-admission in accordance with procedures determined by the Dean.

### *7.2 Withdrawal and discontinuation of enrolment*

#### 7.2.1 Withdrawal from Semester 1 units of study

7.2.1.1 A candidate for a degree of bachelor who discontinues enrolment in a March Semester unit of study on or before 31 March in that year shall be recorded as having withdrawn from that unit.

#### 7.2.2 Withdrawal from Semester 2 units of study

7.2.2.1 A candidate for a degree of bachelor who discontinues enrolment in a July Semester unit of study on or before 31 August in that year shall be recorded as having withdrawn from that unit.

#### 7.2.3 Discontinuation

7.2.3.1 A student who wishes to discontinue enrolment in a course or a unit of study must apply to the Dean or the Dean's nominee.

7.2.3.2 *Discontinued – Not to count as failure*: A candidate for the degree of bachelor who discontinues enrolment in a unit of study after the relevant withdrawal period and up to the last day of the seventh week of teaching in a one semester unit of study, shall be recorded as Discontinued – Not to count as failure (DNF).

7.2.3.3 *Discontinued – Fail*: A candidate for the degree of bachelor who discontinues enrolment in a unit of study after the last day of the seventh week of teaching in a one semester unit of study, shall be recorded as Discontinued – Fail (DF).

7.2.3.4 The Dean, Pro-Dean or an Associate Dean of the faculty may determine that a discontinuation of enrolment should be recorded as Discontinued – Not to count as failure (DNF) on the grounds of serious ill health or misadventure.

#### 7.3 Re-enrolment after an absence

7.3.1 A student who wishes to re-enrol after an absence must contact the Dean in writing no less than six weeks prior to the commencement of the semester to allow administrative processes to be carried out.

#### 7.4 Satisfactory progress – exclusion and re-admission

7.4.1 There are certain circumstances in which a student may be asked to show good cause why he/she should be permitted to repeat any previously attempted study, if, in the opinion of the Faculty Exclusions and Re-admission Committee, he/she has not made satisfactory progress towards fulfilling the requirements of the degree or the unit.

7.4.2 Satisfactory progress cannot be defined in all cases in advance but a student who has failed more than 50 percent of the credit points for which enrolled in the most recent two semesters of enrolment shall be deemed not to have made satisfactory progress.

7.4.3 In cases where the faculty permits the re-enrolment of a student whose progress has been deemed unsatisfactory, the faculty may require the completion of specified units of study in a specified time, and if the student does not comply with these conditions the student may again be called upon to show good cause why he/she should be allowed to re-enrol in the Faculty of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources.

7.4.4.1 It is not possible to define in advance all the reasons that constitute 'good cause' but serious ill health, or misadventure properly attested, will be considered.

7.4.4.2 In addition your general record, for example in other courses, would be taken into account. In particular if you were transferring from another faculty your record in your previous faculty would be considered.

7.4.4.3 Not usually acceptable as good cause are such matters as demands of employers, pressure of employment, time devoted to non-university activities and so on, except as they may be relevant to any serious ill health or misadventure.

### 8. Professional experience

8.1 Students are required to undertake professional experience in university vacations as an integral and essential part of their overall training in the degrees of Bachelor of Agricultural Economics, ~~Bachelor of Horticultural Science, Bachelor of Land and Water Science,~~ Bachelor of Resource Economics and Bachelor of Science in Agriculture.

8.2 *The aims of professional experience are to:*

8.2.1 Familiarise students with agricultural, ~~horticultural~~ or natural resource industries.

8.2.2 Provide the opportunity to experience agricultural and ~~horticultural production and~~ natural resource management across a range of environments and managerial systems.

8.2.3 Provide experience with business organisations involved in finance, marketing, research and development and other aspects of the rural industries, and

8.2.4 Train students to collect, collate, analyse and report.

8.3 For all the bachelor's degrees of Agricultural Economics, Resource Economics and Science in Agriculture

~~Please note: Students enrolled in the Bachelor of Land and Water Science who commenced their enrolment in 2004 need to attend one faculty excursion only to satisfy their professional experience requirements.~~

~~For all other students:~~

8.3.1 Candidates must complete a minimum of 60 days of professional experience.

8.3.1.1 Each component of the experience must be approved on behalf of the Dean before credit is granted. A minimum of 30 days must be completed as on-farm/field experience with the minimum on any enterprise being 10 days.

8.3.1.2 A maximum of 20 days may be credited on property which is owned by the candidate's parents or the University.

8.3.1.3 The farms concerned must be commercial farms not hobby farms. Commercial farms are defined as those having a gross income of at least \$25,000.

8.3.1.4 Field experience relates to work undertaken in practical settings for example Landcare, survey work, etc.

8.3.1.5 In addition, candidates must complete a minimum of 30 days 'graduate placement' (minimum 10 days at any one enterprise). Graduate placement is non-farm experience, typically with organisations with whom graduates find employment (e.g. NSW Department of Primary Industries, finance organisations, etc) experiencing the kind of work they will find as a graduate.

8.3.2 A separate professional experience report must be submitted following each visit to a farm or organisation.

8.3.2.1 Credit is subject to a satisfactory and timely report.

8.3.2.2 Late reports normally are not credited. Time penalties are applied to resubmitted and incomplete reports.

8.3.3 In addition to the 60 days minimum professional experience, students must attend one of the North Western, Central or South Western New South Wales excursions arranged by the faculty.

8.3.4 Final year students wishing to graduate must complete all practical work requirements by 31 January of the year of graduation. Reports from graduands submitted after 31 January will not be marked until the July semester.

**9. Faculty excursions**

9.1 All students in the degrees of Bachelor of Agricultural Economics, Bachelor of Resource Economics and Bachelor Science in Agriculture must attend at least one faculty NSW excursion. The excursions are normally held each year as follows:

9.1.1 Central West – at Easter, from Easter Monday

9.1.2 South West Excursion – in the second semester mid-semester break (the end of September, just before the October long weekend).

9.1.3 North West Excursion – during Orientation Week.

9.2 The faculty arranges all local transport, food and accommodation. Students are required to meet reasonable living costs.

## **Resolutions of Senate**

### **Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences/Bachelor of Laws**

The Resolutions of Senate relating to the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences/Bachelor of Laws in the Faculty of Arts and Faculty of Law are inserted, with effect from 1 January 2010, as follows:

### **Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences/Bachelor of Laws**

#### **1. Requirements for the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences and Bachelor of Laws**

1.1 To qualify for the award of the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences and Bachelor of Laws a student must:

1.1.1 complete successfully units of study giving credit for a total of 240 credit points; and

1.1.2 satisfy the requirements of all other relevant By-laws, Rules and Resolutions of the University including Faculty Resolutions relating to the course.

#### **2. Requirements for the honours degree**

2.1 To qualify for the award of the honours degree a student must complete the honours requirements published in the Faculty Resolutions relating to the course.

## Resolutions of Faculty

### **Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences/Bachelor of Laws**

The Resolutions of Faculty relating to the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences/Bachelor of Laws in the Faculty of Arts and Faculty of Law are inserted, with effect from 1 January 2010, as follows:

### **Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences and Bachelor of Laws**

#### **1. Cross-faculty management of the combined degree**

1.1 Students will be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Arts until the end of the semester in which they complete the requirements for the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences.

1.2 They will then be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Law.

1.3 The Deans of the Faculty of Arts and the Faculty of Law shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined award course not otherwise dealt with in these resolutions.

#### **2. Units of study**

2.1 The units of study which may be taken for the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences are set out under the *Tables of undergraduate units of study* in the Faculty of Arts Handbook, together with:

2.1.1 designation as junior, senior or honours level;

2.1.2 credit point value;

2.1.3 the units of study with which they are mutually exclusive;

2.1.4 corequisites/prerequisites/assumed learning/ assumed knowledge; and

2.1.5 any special conditions.

2.2 The units of study which may be taken for the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) are set out under the *Tables of undergraduate units of study* in the Faculty of Law Handbook, together with:

2.2.1 designation as compulsory or optional;

2.2.2 credit point value;

2.2.3 the units of study with which they are mutually exclusive;

2.2.4 corequisites/prerequisites/ assumed learning/assumed knowledge; and

2.2.5 any special conditions.

#### **3. Requirements for the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences and the Bachelor of Laws**

3.1 To qualify for the award of the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences and Bachelor of Laws a student must complete successfully units of study amounting to a total of 240 credit points.

3.2 To qualify for the award of the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences degree a student must complete successfully units of study amounting to a total of 144 credit points, including:

3.2.1 10 compulsory LAWS units of study (48 credit points) as specified in the Faculty of Arts Handbook;

3.2.2 no more than 48 junior credit points in total;

3.2.3 a minimum of 96 senior credit points;

3.2.4 a core major in one of the following subject areas:

3.2.4.1 Anthropology

3.2.4.2 Government and International Relations

3.2.4.3 Political Economy

3.2.4.4 Sociology

3.2.5 at least 12 senior credit points from each of Government and International Relations, Political Economy, and either Anthropology or Sociology.

3.2.6 A Faculty of Arts major consists of 36 senior credit points in a single subject area or from pre-approved cross-listing in the Arts Undergraduate Resolutions; a major from another faculty is as defined by that faculty. The testamur for the degree shall specify the major/s.

3.3 To qualify for the degree of Bachelor of Laws, in the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences and Bachelor of Laws combined degree program a student must complete units of study to the value of 144 credit points, made up of the following:

3.3.1 96 credit points of the compulsory units of study, which includes the 48 credit points of LAWS units of study listed in 3.5.1 and counted towards the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences;

3.3.2 48 credit points of the elective units of study in the Faculty of Law Undergraduate Resolutions that must include:

3.3.2.1 a maximum of 42 credit points from the units of study listed in Part One of the *Undergraduate units of study table*, and

3.3.2.2 a minimum of six credit points from the units of study listed in Part Two of the *Undergraduate units of study table*.

3.4 Candidates may credit the following units of study to both the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Science and the Bachelor of Laws:

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3.6 Except with the permission of the Dean or Associate Dean (Undergraduate) of the Faculty of Law, candidates in a Combined Law program must successfully complete *Foundations of Law* before enrolling in any other Bachelor of Laws units of study.

3.7 Students must complete the requirements for the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences before proceeding to the Bachelor of Laws (unless they have permission from the Faculty of Law stating otherwise).

3.8 On written application to the Faculty of Arts, a student may abandon their candidature in the combined degree program and elect to transfer to the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences degree in accordance with the Resolutions governing that degree at the time of transfer.

#### 4. Requirements for the award of honours

4.1 Both the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences and the Bachelor of Laws may be awarded with honours.

4.2 To qualify for the award of honours in the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences (Honours) a student in the combined Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences and Bachelor of Laws degree must:

4.2.1 with the permission of the Faculty of Law, either suspend their candidature for the Bachelor of Laws degree while undertaking the honours course, or undertake the honours course after completion of both degrees in the combined degree program; and

4.2.2 complete the requirements outlined in Section 4 *Requirements for honours degrees* in the Faculty of Arts Resolutions relating to undergraduate degrees and combined degrees in the Faculty of Arts Handbook.

4.2.3 To qualify to enrol in the honours program in the Faculty of Law candidates shall:

4.2.3.1 Be selected in the penultimate year of the Bachelor of Laws degree;

4.2.3.2 Have a weighted average mark (WAM) of at least 75, averaged across all law compulsories with the exception of Foundations of Law;

4.2.3.2.1 Entry to the Honours program is competitive and the number of places in the Honours program each year is limited and dependant on available resources. The exact WAM will be determined by the Honours Committee on an annual basis.

4.3.2 The Honours program will be assessed by an honours dissertation, completed under the supervision of an academic member of staff or adjunct staff.

4.3.2.1 Candidates will enrol in two specified 6 credit point Honours research units as listed in the *Table of undergraduate units of study* in Part 2 of the Bachelor of Laws resolutions.

4.3.2.2 These units will be included in the 48 credit points of elective subjects that are part of the pass requirements for the Bachelor of Laws.

4.3.3 The Faculty Honours Committee will determine the class of honours, based on a student's final Honours WAM (HWAM).

4.3.3.1 The HWAM will be drawn from a minimum of 90 credit points, and will include all compulsories and elective units undertaken at the University of Sydney, with the exception of Foundations of Law.

4.3.3.2 The weighting of the Honours research units will be double that of the non Honours units.

4.3.4 Honours in the Bachelor of Laws may be awarded in two classes: Class I and Class II.

4.3.4.1 The honours degree of the Bachelor of Laws will be awarded on the following basis:

4.3.4.1.1 Honours Class I: those students with a HWAM of at least 80;

4.3.4.1.2 Honours Class II/Division 1: those students with a HWAM of at least 75

4.3.4.1.3 The Faculty Honours Committee will have the discretion to vary the required HWAM in exception circumstances.

4.3.4.2 To be awarded honours, a student must pass the honours dissertation.

4.3.4.3 A candidate for the Honours program who does not meet the requirements for the award of honours may be awarded the Bachelor of Laws pass degree.

4.3.4.4 All pass and honours students will be ranked together for graduate purposes to achieve a final graduation ranking.

4.3.4.5 Students who qualify for the award of first class honours, and whose work is of outstanding merit in the opinion of the Faculty; may be considered for the award of a University Medal.

4.3.5 These resolutions will apply to all students who complete their Bachelor of Laws degree in the July semester 2013 or later.

4.3.5.1 Students who complete the requirements of their degree by 31 July 2013 will have honours awarded in accordance with the Faculty resolutions in force at the time of commencement.

#### **5. Award of Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences and Bachelor of Laws**

5.1 A student who completes the requirements of the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences and Bachelor of Laws shall receive at graduation a separate testamur for each of the degrees.

5.2 The Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences and the Bachelor of Laws may be awarded in two grades, namely pass and honours.

5.2.1 The testamur for pass degree of Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences shall specify the major completed.

5.2.2 The testamur for the Bachelor of Political, Economic and Social Sciences with honours shall specify the subject area and the class of honours. It shall not include majors.

Faculty Rules

#### **6. Details of Units of Study**

6.1 Students are to refer to the *Table of Units of Study* provided in the *Arts Undergraduate Handbook*. For LAWS units of study refer to the *Tables of Units of Study* in the *Law Handbook*.

#### **7. Satisfactory progress**

7.1 The Faculty requires students to demonstrate satisfactory progress with their studies.

7.2 A student may be deemed not to have made satisfactory progress in any semester if the student:

7.2.1 fails to complete at least half the credit points in which he/she is enrolled; or

7.2.2 obtains a Weighted Average Mark (WAM) of less than 50 based on units of study for a given semester; or

7.2.3 fails a unit of study for the second time; or

7.2.4 has an unsatisfactory attendance record; or

7.2.5 is unable to complete the degree in the maximum time permitted.

7.3 A student who fails to demonstrate satisfactory progress in any semester of enrolment may be considered to fall into the "Students at Risk" category and will be subject to the procedures of University policy on Identifying and Supporting Students at Risk.

7.4 A student who has been identified as being at risk on three consecutive instances will normally be called upon to show good cause why he or she should be allowed to re-enrol in the degree course.

7.5 Where a student fails to show good cause why he or she should be allowed to re-enrol, the Dean may exclude the student from re-enrolment in the degree.

#### **8. Assessment policy**

8.1 The assessment requirements for each unit of study are outlined in the Arts Faculty Handbook and detailed in the departmental information distributed to students enrolled in that unit.

## Resolutions of Faculty

### Bachelor of Education

The Resolutions of Faculty relating to the Bachelor of Education in the Faculty of Education and Social Work are amended, with effect from 1 January 2010, as follows (additions indicated by underlined, deletions indicated by strikethrough):

### Bachelor of Education

#### 1. Pass degree and degree with honours

1.1 The degree of Bachelor of Education shall be awarded in two grades, namely, the pass degree and the degree with honours.

1.2 The pass degree shall be in the pass grade only – provided that an outstanding candidate may be awarded the degree with merit according to Academic Board policy.

1.3 There shall be two classes of honours, namely, Class I and Class II and within Class II there shall be two divisions, namely division 1 and division 2.

#### 2. Progression within the degree

2.1 Professional experience is an essential requirement for all Bachelor of Education award courses.

2.2 A candidate shall not progress with their award course at the beginning of any year without successfully completing the required professional experience units of study for the previous year (refer 5.2 – Satisfactory progress).

#### 3. Units of study of enrolment undertaken in other faculties

3.1 A candidate for the degree who enrolls in accordance with these resolutions in a unit of study prescribed for a degree offered by the Faculties of Arts, Science or Economics and Business shall satisfy the prerequisites, corequisites and other requirements prescribed for such unit of study for that other degree.

#### 4. Transitional provisions

4.1 These resolutions shall apply to all persons enrolled as of 1 January 2006 in an undergraduate program of the Faculty of Education and Social Work; notwithstanding any resolutions in place at the time the candidate enrolled in the degree.

#### Programs of study - pass degree

##### Early Childhood Education

1. Except with the permission of the Faculty, a candidate for the degree in Early Childhood shall complete the following program of units of study:

##### 1.1 Year I

1.1.1 Junior units of study in Education, as specified in the Table of units of study, with a total value of 12 credit points; and

1.1.2 Junior units of study in Professional Studies in Early Childhood, as specified for Year 1 in the Table of units of study, with a total value of 24 credit points; and

1.1.3 Junior or First Year, 100 level, units of study comprising a full year of study in a subject area, 12 credit points, offered by a department or school within each of the Faculties of Arts, Science or Economics and Business.

##### 1.2 Year II

1.2.1 Senior, 200 level, units of study in Education taken as specified in the Table of units of study, 12 credit points; and

1.2.2 Program of 200 level units of study in Curriculum and Professional Studies in Early Childhood as specified in the Table of units of study, total of 24 credit points; and

##### 1.2.3 Either:

1.2.3.1 Senior, 200 level, units of study, comprising a full year of study in a subject area, with total of 12 credit points, offered by a department or school within the Faculty of Arts; or

1.2.3.2 Intermediate units of study, comprising a full year of study in a subject area, total of 12 credit points, offered by a department or school within the Faculty of Science; or

1.2.3.3 Second Year units of study, comprising a full year of study in a subject area, total of 12 credit points, offered by a department or school within the Faculty of Economics and Business.

##### 1.3 Year III

1.3.1 Senior, 300 level, units of study in Education taken from those listed in the Table of units of study, including specified units, total of 12 credit points; and

1.3.2 Program of Senior, 300 level, units of study in Curriculum and Professional Studies in Early Childhood taken from those listed in the Table of units of study, including specified units, total of 36 credit points.

#### 1.4 Year IV

1.4.1 Senior, 300 level, units of study in Education taken from those listed in the Table of units of study, including specified units, total of 12 credit points; and

1.4.2 Program of Senior, 400 level, units of study in Curriculum and Professional Studies in Early Childhood taken from those listed in the Table of units of study, including specified units, total of 36 credit points.

### **Primary Education**

1. Except with the permission of the Faculty, a candidate for the degree in Primary Education shall complete the following program of units of study:

#### *1.1 Year I*

1.1.1 Junior units of study in Education, as specified in the Table of units of study, with a total value of 12 credit points; and

1.1.2 Science Foundations 1 and Science Foundations 2;

1.1.3 Junior units of study in Professional Studies in Primary education, as specified for Year 1 in the Table of units of study, with a total value of 12 credit points; and

1.1.4 Junior or First Year, 100 level, units of study comprising a full year of study in a subject area, 12 credit points, offered by a department or school within either of the Faculties of Arts, Science or Economics and Business.

1.2.3.2 Intermediate units of study, comprising a full year of study in a subject area, total of 12 credit points, offered by a department or school within the Faculty of Science; or

1.2.3.3 Second Year units of study, comprising a full year of study in a subject area, total of 12 credit points, offered by a department or school within the Faculty of Economics and Business.

#### *1.3 Year III*

1.3.1 Senior, 300 level, units of study in Education taken from those listed in the Table of units of study, including specified units, total of 12 credit points.

1.3.2 Program of Senior, 300 level, units of study in Curriculum and Professional Studies in Primary Education taken from those listed in the Table of units of study, including specified units, total of 36 credit points.

#### *1.4 Year IV*

1.4.1 Senior, 300 level, units of study in Education taken from those listed in the Table of units of study, including specified units, total of 12 credit points;

1.4.2 Program of Senior, 400 level, units of study in Curriculum and Professional Studies in Primary Education taken from those listed in the Table of units of study, including specified units total of 36 credit points.

### **Secondary Education**

#### **Human Movement and Health Education**

1. Except with the permission of the Faculty, a candidate for the degree in Secondary Education in the areas of human movement and health education shall complete the following program of units of study:

#### *1.1 Year I*

1.1.1 Junior units of study in Education, as specified in the Table of units of study, total of 12

credit points; and

1.1.2 Sports Mechanics; 12 credit points and

1.1.3 Junior units of study in Professional Studies in Human Movement and Health Education, as specified for Year I in the Table of units of study, total of 12 credit points; and

1.1.4 Junior or First Year, 100 level, units of study comprising a full year of study in a subject area, total of 12 credit points, offered by a department or school in either of the Faculties of Arts, Science or Economics and Business.

*1.2 Year II*

1.2.1 Senior, 200 level, units of study in Education taken as specified in the Table of units of study, total of 12 credit points; and

1.2.2 Program of 200 level units of study in Curriculum and Professional Studies in Human Movement and Health Education, as specified in the Table of units of study, total of 24 credit points;

### **Bachelor of Information Technology/Bachelor of Laws**

#### **1. Requirements for the Bachelor of Information Technology and Bachelor of Laws**

1.1 To qualify for the award of the Bachelor of Information Technology and Bachelor of Laws a student must:

1.1.1 complete successfully units of study giving credit for a total of 288 credit points; and

1.1.2 satisfy the requirements of all other relevant By-laws, Rules and Resolutions of the University including Faculty Resolutions relating to the course.

#### **2. Requirements for the honours degree**

2.1 To qualify for the award of the honours degree a student must complete the honours requirements published in the Faculty Resolutions relating to the course.

## Resolutions of Faculty

### **Bachelor of Information Technology/Bachelor of Laws**

The Resolutions of Faculty relating to the Bachelor of Information Technology/Bachelor of Laws in the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies and Faculty of Law are inserted, with effect from 1 January 2010, as follows:

### **Bachelor of Information Technology/Bachelor of Laws**

Resolutions related to admission, units of study, progression, assessment, credit, cross-institutional study, advanced standing and completion for all students enrolled in a degree in the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies are published in section 2 of the faculty handbook.

### **Combined Degree Specific Resolutions.**

#### 1. Cross-faculty management of combined degree course

1.1 Candidates in a combined BIT/LLB program are under the general supervision of the Engineering and Information Technologies Faculty in which they are enrolled until the end of the semester in which they complete the requirements of the Information Technology degree.

1.1.1 While enrolled in the Bachelor of Engineering (BE) degree students will be subject to the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies resolutions covering admission, enrolment restrictions, progression requirements, satisfactory progress, cross-institutional study, examination and assessment criteria as shown in the Faculty Handbook.

1.2 After that, they will be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Law.

1.3 The Deans of the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies and the Faculty of Law shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined award course not otherwise dealt with in these Resolutions.

#### 2. Units of study

2.1.1 The units of study which may be taken for the IT streams and the flexible first year program in the Bachelor of Information Technology (BIT) are set out in the Bachelor of Information Technology Stream Tables in the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies Handbook.

2.1.2 These stream requirements indicate:

2.1.2.1 the core units of study prescribed, and the recommended units available, for each stream;

2.1.2.2 the credit point values of the units;

2.1.2.3 any assumed knowledge, prerequisite or corequisite requirements; and

2.1.2.4 any prohibitions placed on units of study.

2.1.3 A unit of study shall comprise such lectures, tutorial instruction, assignments and practical work as the Faculty may prescribe.

2.1.4 In order to complete a unit of study a student shall, except as provided in the section entitled Progression in the Resolutions of the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies, in the Faculty Handbook:

2.1.4.1 attend the lectures and laboratory/tutorial classes;

2.1.4.2 complete satisfactorily any assignments and practical work; and

2.1.4.3 pass any examinations prescribed for that unit.

2.1.5 A student may enrol in units of study only in accordance with these Resolutions and subject to the constraints of the timetable, unless approval is given by the head of the relevant school.

2.2 The units of study which may be taken for the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) are set out in the *Undergraduate units of study table* in the Faculty of Law Handbook, together with:

2.2.1 designation as compulsory or elective;

2.2.2 credit point value;

2.2.3 the units of study with which they are mutually exclusive;

2.2.4 assumed knowledge/prerequisites/corequisites/prohibition; and

2.2.5 any special conditions.

### 3. Requirements for the Bachelor of Information Technology (BIT) and the Bachelor of Laws (LLB)

3.1 To qualify for the award of the pass degrees a student shall complete a minimum of 288 credit points.

3.2 To qualify for the award of the Bachelor of Information Technology (BIT) in the Bachelor of Engineering and Bachelor of Laws (BIT/LLB) combined degree program a student must complete:

3.2.1 48 credit points of LAWS units of study as listed below in 3.5.1, and

3.2.2 units of study as prescribed in the BIT stream tables.

3.3 To qualify for the degree of Bachelor of Laws (LLB), in the Bachelor of Information Technology and Bachelor of Laws (BIT/LLB) combined degree program a student must complete units of study to the value of 144 credit points, made up of the following:

3.3.1 96 credit points of the compulsory units of study, which includes the 48 credit points of LAWS units of study listed below in 3.5.1 and counted towards the Bachelor of Information Technology (BIT);

3.3.2 48 credit points of the elective units of study in the Faculty of Law Handbook that must include:

3.3.2.1 a maximum of 42 credit points from the units of study listed in Part 1 of the *Undergraduate units of study table*, and

3.3.2.2 a minimum of six credit points from the units of study listed in Part 2 of the *Undergraduate units of study table*.

3.4 Candidates may credit the following units of study to both the Bachelor of Information Technology (BIT) and the Bachelor of Laws (LLB):

3.6 Except with the permission of the Dean or Associate Dean (Undergraduate), candidates in a combined Law program must successfully complete *Foundations of Law* before enrolling in any other Bachelor of Laws (LLB) units of study.

3.7 Students must complete the requirements for the Bachelor of Information Technology (BIT) before proceeding to the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) (unless they have permission from the Faculty of Law stating otherwise).

4. Requirements for award of Honours

4.1 Both the Bachelor of Information Technology (BIT) and the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) may be awarded with Honours.

4.2 To qualify for the award of the Bachelor of Information Technology (BIT) (Honours) degree student must:

4.2.1 Qualify to transfer into the Bachelor of Information Technology (Honours) degree. To qualify for entry students shall:

4.2.1.1 have completed at least 144 credit points from the Bachelor of Information Technology degree;

4.2.1.2 have completed the requirements of a stream in either Computer Science or Information Systems associated with the degree of Bachelor of Information Technology;

4.2.1.3 have achieved either a credit average in the relevant units of study used to satisfy an ISWAM of at least 65;

4.2.1.4 satisfy any additional criteria set by the head of school concerned; and

4.2.1.5 with the permission of the Faculty of Law, either suspend their candidature for the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) degree while undertaking the honours course, or undertake the honours course after completion of both degrees in the combined degree program.

4.2.2 Once enrolled in the BIT (Honours) course, students shall complete the requirements for the honours course full-time, over two consecutive semesters.

4.2.3 To qualify for the award of the Bachelor of Information Technology (Honours) degree, students shall complete 192 credit points, including 48 credit points of units of study at the 4000 or 5000 level, of which at least 42 credit points must be from 4000 and 5000 level core and selected core units listed in the BIT table, including INFO4991, INFO4992 and INFO4999, with a result of at least 65 in INFO4999.

4.2.4 The grade of Honours and the Honours mark are determined by performance in all 4000 and 5000 level units attempted from the BIT table.

4.2.5 Honours in the Bachelor of Information Technology may be awarded in four classes as follows:

4.2.5.1 Class I (Honours mark range: 80 and above)

4.2.5.2 Class II(1) (Honours mark range: 75–79)

4.2.5.3 Class II(2) (Honours mark range: 70–74)

4.2.5.4 Class III (Honours mark range: 65–69)

4.2.6 A student with an Honours mark of 90 or greater and a minimum ISWAM of 80 shall, if deemed to be of sufficient merit by the Dean, be awarded a University Medal.

4.2.7 A student may not re-attempt the Bachelor of Information Technology (Honours) course. However, students who fail to meet the requirements for the award of honours and who have not already satisfied the requirements of the BIT may elect to transfer back to the BIT. A student who does not meet the requirements for the award of honours and who has completed the requirements of the BIT shall graduate with the BIT Pass degree.

4.3.1 To qualify to enrol in the Bachelor of Laws (LLB) (Honours) program candidates shall:

4.3.1.1 Be selected in the penultimate year of the Bachelor of Law degree;

4.3.1.2 Have a weighted average mark (WAM) of at least 75, averaged out across all law compulsories with the exception of Foundations of Law.

4.3.1.2.1 Results in elective subjects will not be included in the calculation.

4.3.1.2.2 Entry to the Honours program is competitive and the number of places in the Honours program each year is limited and dependant on available resources. The exact WAM will be determined by the Honours Committee on an annual basis.

4.3.2 The honours program will be assessed by an honours dissertation, completed under the supervision of an academic member of staff or adjunct staff.

4.3.2.1 Candidates will enrol in two specified 6 credit point Honours research units as listed in the "Table of undergraduate units of study" in Part 2 of the Bachelor of Laws resolutions.

4.3.2.2 These units will be included in the 48 credit points of elective subjects that are part of the pass requirements for the Bachelor of Laws.

4.3.3 The Faculty Honours Committee will determine the class of honours, based on a student's final Honours WAM (HWAM).

4.3.3.1 The HWAM will be drawn from a minimum of 90 credit points, and will include all compulsories and elective units undertaken at the University of Sydney, with the exception of Foundations of Law.

4.3.3.2 The weighting of the Honours research units will be double that of the non-Honours units.

4.3.4 Honours in the Bachelor of Laws may be awarded in two classes: Class I and Class II.

4.3.4.1 The honours degree of the Bachelor of Laws may be awarded on the following basis:

4.3.4.1.1 Honours class 1: those students with an HWAM of at least 80;

4.3.4.1.2 Honours class 2/ Division 1: those students with an HWAM of at least 75;

4.3.4.1.3 The Faculty Honours Committee will have the discretion to vary the required HWAM in exceptional circumstances.

4.3.4.2 To be awarded honours, a student must pass the honours dissertation.

4.3.4.3 A candidate for the Honours program who does not meet the requirements for the award of honours may be awarded the Bachelor of Laws pass degree.

4.3.4.4 All pass and honours students will be ranked together for graduation purposes to achieve a final graduation ranking.

4.3.4.5 Students who qualify for the award of first class honours, and whose work is of outstanding merit in the opinion of the faculty, may be considered for the award of a University medal.

4.3.5 These resolutions will apply to all students who complete their degree in the July semester 2013 or later.

4.3.5.1 Students who complete the requirements of their degree by 31 July 2013 will have honours awarded in accordance with the Faculty resolutions in force at the time of commencement.

~~1.4.4 Students in years 1–4 of the combined degrees course will be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Health Sciences; students in the honours year will be under the supervision of the faculty in which the honours course is being undertaken.~~

~~1.4.5 The Deans of the Faculties of Health Sciences and Science shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined degrees course not otherwise dealt with in these Resolutions.~~

1.5 A unit of study shall consist of lectures together with such clinical, laboratory and tutorial instruction, practical work, exercises and essays as may be prescribed by the Faculty or the academic unit concerned.

1.5.1 The words 'to complete a unit of study' and derivative expressions mean:

1.5.1.1 to attend the lectures and the meetings, if any, for clinical, laboratory or tutorial instruction; and

1.5.1.2 to obtain a passing grade for that unit of study in accordance with the assessment criteria prescribed by the Faculty or the academic unit concerned.

1.5.2 A candidate permitted to re-enrol in a unit of study which has previously not been satisfactorily completed shall, unless exempted by the Faculty, again complete all the work of the unit.

2.10 Candidates are normally enrolled in four compulsory units of study in Semester 1 of Combined Law 4/Graduate Law 2, and in four compulsory units of study in Semester 2 of that same year.

2.10.1 If candidates so elect, they may replace one compulsory unit with one elective unit in each semester.

2.10.2 Where such a replacement has occurred, candidates must enrol in the postponed compulsory unit(s) in the final year of their candidature.

### **3. Requirements for the honours degree**

3.1 To qualify to enrol in the honours program candidates shall:

3.1.1 Be selected in the penultimate year of the Bachelor of Law degree;

3.1.2 Have a weighted average mark (WAM) of at least 75, averaged out across all law compulsories with the exception of Foundations of Law.

3.1.2.1 Results in elective subjects will not be included in the calculation.

3.1.2.2 Entry to the Honours program is competitive and the number of places in the Honours program each year is limited and dependent on available resources. The exact WAM will be determined by the Honours Committee on an annual basis.

3.2 The honours program will be assessed by an honours dissertation, completed under the supervision of an academic member of staff or adjunct staff:

3.2.1 Candidates will enrol in two specified 6 credit point Honours research units as listed in the "Table of undergraduate units of study" in Part 2 of the Bachelor of Laws resolutions.

3.2.2 These units will be included in the 48 credit points of elective subjects that are part of the pass requirements of the Bachelor of Laws.

3.3 The Faculty Honours Committee will determine the class of honours, based on a student's final Honours WAM (HWAM).

3.3.1 The HWAM will be drawn from a minimum of 90 credit points, and will include all compulsories and elective units undertaken at the University of Sydney, with the exception of Foundations of Laws.

3.3.2 The weighting of the honours research units will be double that of the non-Honours units.

3.4 Honours in the Bachelor of Laws may be awarded in two classes: Class I and Class II.

3.4.1 The honours degree of the Bachelor of Laws will be awarded on the following basis:

3.4.1.1 Honours class 1: those student with an HWAM of at least 80;

3.4.1.2 Honours class 2/Division 1: those students with an HWAM of at least 75;

3.4.1.3 The Faculty Honours Committee will have the discretion to vary the required HWAM in exceptional circumstances.

3.4.2 To be awarded honours, a student must pass the honours dissertation.

3.4.3 A candidate for the Honours program who does not meet the requirements for the award of honours may be awarded the Bachelor of Laws pass degree.

3.4.4 All pass and honours students will be ranked together for graduation purposes to achieve a final graduation ranking.

3.4.5 Students who qualify for the award of first class honours, and whose work is of outstanding merit in the opinion of the faculty, may be considered for the award of a University medal.

3.5 These resolutions will apply to all students who will complete their degree in the July semester 2013 or later.

### Bachelor of Science/Bachelor of Arts

#### 1. Admission

1.1 All applications for admission to candidature to an undergraduate degree or combined degree in the Faculty of Science will be subject to the Undergraduate Admissions policy of the University of Sydney.

1.1.1 A candidate for the BSc, BSc(Advanced) or BSc(Advanced Mathematics) may apply to the Dean for permission to transfer candidature to any other stream.

1.2 Cross-Faculty Management of Combined Degree Course

1.2.1 The primary Faculty for management of the combined course is the Faculty of Science. The Deans of the Faculties of Arts and Science shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined degrees not otherwise dealt with in these resolutions.

#### 2. Requirements for the degree

2.1 To qualify for the award of the pass degrees a student shall complete from the *Table of undergraduate units of study* for the Bachelor of Science and from the *Table of units of study* for the Bachelor of Arts, units of study having a total value of ~~240~~ 192 credit points, including:

2.1.1 ~~no more than 96 credit points from junior units of study, with~~ no more than 18 junior credit points from the same Arts subject area;

2.1.2 at least 96 credit points from Science subject areas, including

2.1.2.1 at least 12 credit points from the Science subject area of Mathematics and Statistics;

2.1.2.2 at least 24 credit points of junior units of study from at least two Science subject areas other than Mathematics & Statistics;

2.1.2.3 a major in a Science area as defined in Table I for the Bachelor of Science, normally requiring the completion of 24 credit points of senior units of study in one Science area, including any units of study specified in the table as compulsory for that major;

2.1.3 at least 72 credit points of senior units of study in Arts subject areas from Part A including

2.1.3.1 a Part A major consisting of 36 senior credit points in a single subject area listed in Part A of the table of units of study for the Bachelor of Arts or of at least 18 senior credit points from a Part A subject area combined with no more than 18 senior credit points from units of study approved by the Dean of Arts for cross-listing with the major, except in the case of Medieval Studies, Film Studies, European Studies and Asian Studies where the entire major may be cross-listed, and in such other subject areas as may be approved by the Dean of Arts;

2.1.3.2 no more than 60 senior credit points from the same Arts subject area.

2.1.4 A student may not count a unit of study toward more than one major.

2.1.5 The testamurs for the degrees of Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts shall specify the major(s) completed in order to qualify for the awards.

#### 3. Specially designated streams

3.1 A student may proceed concurrently to the degrees of Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science (Advanced) and Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science (Advanced Mathematics) and Bachelor of Arts.

#### 3.2 BSc(Advanced)

3.2.1 To qualify for the award of the pass degree in the Advanced stream of the BSc degree, a student shall complete the requirements for the BSc degree in subsection 2 and in addition, except with the permission of the Dean:

3.2.1.1 include at least 12 credit points of Intermediate Science units of study at either the Advanced level or as TSP units;

3.2.1.2 include at least 24 credit points of Senior units of study at the Advanced level or as TSP units in a single Science subject area; and

3.2.1.3 maintain in Intermediate and Senior units of study in Science subject areas an average mark of 65 or greater in each year of enrolment.

3.2.2 Candidates who fail to maintain the required Credit average will be transferred to candidature for the Bachelor of Science degree in their next year of enrolment with full credit for the units of study completed in the Advanced stream. Candidates who fail to achieve a Credit average across all units of study attempted in the year in which they have otherwise completed the requirements for the degree will be awarded the Bachelor of Science.

3.2.3 Students who have completed at least 48 credit points may be permitted to transfer to the BSc (Advanced) stream from the BSc or BSc (Advanced Mathematics) if:

3.2.3.1 their mark averaged over all attempted units of study is 75 or greater; and

3.2.3.2 they are able to enrol in the required number of Advanced level units or TSP units.

3.2.4 The testamur for the degree of Bachelor of Science (Advanced) shall specify the major(s) completed in order to qualify for the award.

### **3.3 BSc (Advanced Mathematics)**

3.3.1 To qualify for the award of the pass degree in the Advanced Mathematics stream of the BSc degree, a student shall complete the requirements for the BSc degree in subsection 2 and in addition, except with the permission of the Dean:

3.3.1.1 include no more than 48 credit points from junior Science units of study;

3.3.1.2 include at least 12 credit points of intermediate units of study at either the Advanced level or as TSP units in the Science subject areas of Mathematics and Statistics;

3.3.1.3 include a major in Mathematics, Statistics or Financial Mathematics and Statistics;

3.3.1.4 include at least 48 credit points of senior units of study of which at least 24 are completed at the Advanced level or as TSP units in the Science subject areas of Mathematics and Statistics; and

3.3.1.5 maintain in intermediate and senior units of study in Science subject areas an average mark of 65 or greater in each year of enrolment.

3.3.2 Candidates who fail to maintain the required Credit average will be transferred to candidature for the Bachelor of Science degree in their next year of enrolment with full credit for the units of study completed as Bachelor of Science (Advanced Mathematics) candidates. Candidates who fail to achieve a Credit average across all units of study attempted in the year in which they have otherwise completed the requirements for the degree will be awarded the Bachelor of Science.

3.3.3 Students who have completed at least 48 credit points may be permitted to transfer to the BSc (Advanced Mathematics) stream from the BSc or BSc(Advanced) if:

3.3.3.1 their mark averaged over all attempted units of study is 75 or greater; and

3.3.3.2 they are able to enrol in the required number of Advanced level units or TSP units.

- 4.15 Candidature is normally full-time. Full-time students must complete the requirements over two consecutive semesters.
- 4.16 A student may seek permission from the Dean of Arts to undertake the honours course on a part-time basis. Part-time candidature must not exceed four consecutive semesters.
- 4.17 A student may seek written permission from the Dean of Arts to suspend candidature.
- 4.18 Suspension may be granted for a maximum period of one semester.
- 4.19 In the case of a student being granted suspension the student must not exceed five consecutive semesters, including the semester of suspension.
- 4.20 Students resuming the honours course after a period of suspension must advise the Faculty of Arts office in writing of their intention to re-enrol.
- 4.21 A student may not:
  - 4.22.1 enrol in any fourth year unit of study without first qualifying for the award of the pass degree,
  - 4.22.2 be awarded the pass degree while enrolled in final year honours, or
  - 4.22.3 enrol concurrently in a fourth year unit of study and any other course or unit of study,

4.22.4 enrol in more than two fourth year units per semester.

4.23 Candidates for combined degrees are required to transfer to the single Bachelor of Arts candidature when enrolled in fourth year units of study.

4.24 To qualify for the award of an honours degree, students shall complete 48 credit points of honours units of study, comprising four, 12 credit point semester length units of study.

4.25 The grade of honours and the honours mark are determined by performance in the honours course.

4.26 The award of honours degrees, the level at which they are awarded and the award of the University Medal shall be determined by the Dean of Arts on the advice of the Faculty Honours Committee.

4.27 A student with an honours mark of 90 and a meritorious record in previous studies may be considered by the Dean of Arts on the advice of the Faculty Honours Committee for the award of the University Medal.

4.28 The testamur for the honours course shall specify the subject area or areas and the grade of honours, and the medal if awarded. It shall not include majors.

4.29 Students who fail or discontinue - fail final year honours may not re-enrol in it.

#### *Faculty rules*

### **5. Units of study**

5.1 The units of study which may be taken for the degrees of Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts are set out under subject areas in Tables I and VI for the Bachelor of Science and Table Part A and Part B for the Bachelor of Arts together with:

5.1.1 designation as junior, intermediate (in the case of Science units), senior or Honours, and where appropriate as Advanced, units of study

5.1.2 credit point values

5.1.3 corequisites/prerequisites/assumed learning/assumed knowledge

5.1.4 the semesters in which they are offered

5.1.5 the units of study with which they are mutually exclusive

5.1.6 units of study in Part A of the table of units available to BA students cannot be cross-listed to majors in Part B of the table of units of study available to BA students

5.1.7 the faculty responsible for the unit of study; and

5.1.8 any special conditions.

5.2 The Dean may permit a student of exceptional merit who is admitted to the Talented Student Program to undertake a unit or units of study within the Faculty other than those specified in Table I.

5.3 Units of study completed at the University of Sydney Summer/Winter School which correspond to units of study in the table of units of study for the Bachelor of Arts and the Bachelor of Science may be credited towards the course requirements.

### **6. Enrolment in more/less than minimum load**

6.1 A student may not enrol without first obtaining permission from the Dean in additional units of study once the combined degree requirements of ~~240~~ 192 credit points have been satisfied.

6.2 Students may enrol on either a full-time or part-time basis.

### **7. Cross-institutional enrolment**

7.1 Provided that permission has been obtained in advance, the Dean may permit a student to complete a unit of study at another institution and have that unit credited to his/her course requirements provided that either

7.1.1 the unit of study content is material not taught in any corresponding unit of study in the University; or

7.1.2 the student is unable for good reason to attend a corresponding unit of study at the University.

### **8. Restrictions on enrolment**

8.1 Units of study in subject areas in the Faculty of Arts which are restricted to a specific degree are as follows:

8.1.1 Bachelor of Arts Informatics - units of study with the prefix ARIN except ARIN2100 Web Tools available to Bachelor of Arts with departmental permission and ARIN3000 Technocultures available to Bachelor of Arts.

8.1.2 Bachelor of Arts (Media and Communications) - units of study with the prefix MECO

8.1.3 Bachelor of Social Sciences - units of study with the prefix SSCI

8.1.4 Bachelor of Arts (Honours), Bachelor of Arts (Asian Studies) (Honours), Bachelor of Arts (Languages) (Honours), Bachelor of Arts (Media and Communications) (Honours), Bachelor of Informatics (Honours), Bachelor of Social Sciences (Honours) - Bachelor of Arts and Sciences (Honours) all Fourth Year Honours units (4000 units)

8.1.5 Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Laws - units of study with the prefix LAWS

8.1.6 Bachelor of Arts and Sciences degree - units of study with the prefix SLSS

8.2 A student may not enrol in a language based unit of study, if, in the opinion of the Chair of the department involved, on the advice of the teacher of the unit, the student's linguistic knowledge or competence would unfairly advantage them over other students in the unit. If enrolment has already taken place, the Dean may direct that the student be withdrawn without penalty from the unit.

8.3 A candidate may not count a particular unit of study more than once towards the degrees or count two units of study which overlap substantially in content.

8.4 Units of study which overlap substantially in content are noted in the *Tables of undergraduate units of study*. Such units of study are mutually exclusive and no more than one of the overlapping units of study may be counted towards meeting the combined course requirements.

8.5 A candidate may not enrol in units of study having a total value of more than 30 credit points in a semester.

#### **9. Time limits**

9.1 A candidate must complete all the requirements for the award of the degrees within ten calendar years of admission to candidature or readmission without credit. If a candidate is readmitted with credit, the Faculty will determine a reduced time limit for completion of the degrees.

#### **10. Repeating a unit of study**

10.1 Where a student enrolls in a unit of study which is the same as, or has a substantial amount in common with, a unit of study previously attempted but not completed at the grade of Pass or better, the Head of Department concerned may exempt the student from certain requirements of the unit of study if satisfied that the relevant competence has been demonstrated.

10.2 A student may not enrol in a unit of study which they have completed previously with a grade of Pass or better.

#### **11. Discontinuation of enrolment**

11.1 Students may abandon the combined degree course and elect to complete either a Bachelor of Science or a Bachelor of Arts in accordance with the resolutions governing these degrees.

11.2 A student who does not enrol in any semester without first obtaining written permission from the Dean to suspend candidature will be deemed to have discontinued enrolment in the course. Students who have discontinued from the course will be required to apply for admission to the course and be subject to admission requirements pertaining at that time.

#### **12. Suspension of candidature**

12.1 A student may seek written permission from the Dean to suspend candidature in the combined course. Suspension may be granted for a maximum period of one year on any one application.

#### **13. Re-enrolment after an absence**

13.1 A student who intends to re-enrol after a period of suspension must advise the Faculty of Science Office in writing of their intention by no later than the end of October for First semester of the following year or the end of May for Second semester of the same year.

#### **14. Satisfactory progress**

14.1 If a student fails or discontinues enrolment in one unit of study twice, a warning will be issued that if the unit is failed a third time, the student may be asked to show good cause why he or she should be allowed to re-enrol in that unit of study.

#### **15. Assessment policy**

15.1 Students may be tested by written and oral examinations, exercises, essays or practical work or any combination of these as the Faculty may determine.

15.2 Where a unit of study is offered at different levels of difficulty, the performance of students will be matched so that a grade obtained at one level indicates a quality of work comparable with that required for the same grade at the other level(s).

15.3 Heads of Department may arrange for further testing in cases of special consideration, in accordance with Academic Board policy governing illness and misadventure.

#### **16. Credit Transfer Policy**

16.1 Credit will not be granted for units of study completed more than 10 years prior to application, except with the permission of the Dean.

16.2 Credit may be granted as specific credit if the unit of study is considered to be directly equivalent to a unit of study in Table I or as non-specific credit.

16.3 The total amount of credit granted may not be greater than 96 credit points and may not include more than 48 credit points of units of study from other degrees for which credit is maintained or a degree has been conferred.

16.4 All students, notwithstanding any credit transfer, must complete at least 24 credit points of Senior Science units of study towards a major taken at the University of Sydney.

#### **17. Candidates enrolled before 2010**

~~17.1 These Resolutions apply to all candidates for the degrees enrolling in units of study after 1 January, 2006. These resolutions apply to all candidates for the degree enrolling in units of study after 1 January 2010.~~

#### **18. Glossary for the BSc/BA**

18.1 Completion of a unit of study means that the assessment requirements have been satisfied and a grade of Pass or better has been achieved.

18.2 Junior unit of study is a 1000 or first-year stage unit. Its prerequisites or assumed knowledge are non-tertiary qualifications and corequisites are other Junior units of study

18.3 Intermediate unit of study is a 2000 or second-year stage unit. Its prerequisites or assumed knowledge are Junior or Intermediate units of study and corequisites are other Intermediate units of study. (Specific to the Faculty of Science).

18.4 Senior unit of study is a 3000 or third-year stage unit. Its prerequisites or assumed knowledge are Junior, Intermediate or Senior units of study and corequisites are other Senior units of study. (Specific to the Faculty of Science.) A Senior Arts unit of study is a 2000 or 3000 level unit of study. (Specific to the Faculty of Arts.)

18.5 Honours unit of study is a 4000 or fourth-year stage unit offered within an honours course.

18.6 Advanced unit of study is a unit which generally parallels a normal unit of study but which provides added breadth of material and/or sophistication of approach.

18.7 Major in the BSc normally requires the completion of a minimum of 24 credit points of Senior units of study in one Science area, including any units of study specified in the *Table of undergraduate units of study* as compulsory for that major. A student may not count a unit of study toward more than one major. (A major in Psychology requires 48 credit points of Intermediate and Senior Psychology units of study including PSYC(2111 or 2011), PSYC(2112 or 2012), PSYC(2113 or 2013) and PSYC(2114 or 2014). No other Intermediate Psychology units can be counted towards the major).

18.8 Major in the Faculty of Arts is normally 36 credit points from Senior units of study in an Arts subject area.

~~18.9 Major in the Faculty of Economics and Business is usually a three year sequence of study (in some cases a two year sequence) in a particular Economics and Business subject area.~~

~~18.10 Major in the Faculty of Education is 36 credit points from Senior units of study in the subject area of Education.~~

18.9 Dean means the Dean of Science.

18.10 Faculty means the Faculty of Science.

18.11 Science subject area means a defined field of study in science.

18.12 Degrees means the degrees of Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts.

18.13 Requirements means coursework requirements for the award of the degree of Bachelor of Science or Bachelor of Arts.

18.14 Student means a person enrolled as a candidate for the degrees of Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts.

18.15 TSP means the Talented Student Program in the Faculty of Science.

18.16 SCIWAM means the weighted average mark calculated by the Faculty from the results for all Intermediate and Senior units of study with a weighting of 2 for Intermediate units and 3 for Senior units.

#### 0.1 Combined degree course rules

##### 1. Requirements of the BE/BMedSc

1.1 A student may proceed concurrently to the degrees of Bachelor of Medical Science, and Bachelor of Engineering.

1.1 To qualify for the award of the BE/BMedSc combined degree a student must:

1.1.1 complete successfully units of study giving credit for a total of 240 credit points; and

1.1.2 satisfy the requirements of all other relevant By-laws, Rules and Resolutions of the University.

1.2 Admission, progression and assessment criteria apply and are described in the resolutions for the BE specialisations shown in the relevant section of the faculty handbook.

1.3 Students will be under the general supervision of the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies for administrative matters.

1.4 The Faculty of Science and the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies shall jointly exercise authority in any academic matter concerning the combined course not otherwise dealt with in these Resolutions.

##### 2. Specialisations, streams and majors

2.1 The combined award course, BE/BMedSc, will be awarded in all of the Engineering specialisations that are available for the BE degree and all majors as are applicable under the resolutions of the Faculty of Science.

##### 3. Requirements for the BE/BMedSc Pass degree

3.1 To qualify for the award of the Pass degrees a student shall complete units of study having a total value of at least 240 credit points including:

3.1.1 Units of study as prescribed in the tables of BE specialisation requirements for the specialisation that the student is pursuing;

~~3.1.2 at least 24 credit points from junior Science units of study (which may be common with those of 3.1.1, but including CHEM1101, CHEM1102 Chemistry 1A,1B, MBLG1001 Introductory Molecular Biology & Genetics and 12 credit points of Mathematics);~~

3.1.2 at least 24 credit points from junior Science units of study (which may be common with those of 3.1.1, but including 12 cp of Junior Chemistry, MBLG1001 Introductory Molecular Biology & Genetics and 12 credit points of Mathematics);

3.1.3 48 credit points of Intermediate core units of study as listed in Table IV of the Science Faculty Handbook of units of study for the BMedSc;

3.1.4 at least 24 credit points of Senior units of study taken from the subject areas of Anatomy/Histology, Biology (Genetics), Biochemistry, Cell Pathology, Immunology, Infectious Diseases, Microbiology, Pharmacology and Physiology;

##### 4. Requirements for the Honours degree

###### 4.1 BE with Honours

4.1.2 On completion of the requirements for the combined degrees, a student may qualify for the award of BE degree with Honours in accordance with the requirements set out in the Resolutions of the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technologies relating to the BE degree.

###### 4.2 BMedSc with Honours

4.2.1 On completion of the requirements for the combined degrees, a student may be qualified to enrol in Honours in the Bachelor of Medical Science.

4.2.2 To qualify for the award of the BMedSc with Honours, a student must complete successfully an additional year of study (the Honours year), as specified in the Faculty of Science Handbook.

5. Units of study

5.1 Units of study must be selected as shown in the Engineering specialisation tables for the core components of the chosen Engineering specialisation and as specified for the MedSc component in clause 3.1 above.

5.2 Units from the Science Faculty must be chosen as shown in the Science Faculty Handbook to meet requirements of a Science major.

5.3 The faculty Resolutions (which are reproduced in the Engineering and Information Technologies and Science Handbooks, as the case may be) specify:

5.3.1 credit point values;

5.3.2 corequisites/prerequisites/assumed learning/ assumed knowledge; and

5.3.3 any special conditions.

6. Students may at any stage abandon the combined degree course and elect to complete either a BMedSc or a BE in accordance with the resolutions governing those degrees.

7. Resolutions covering admission, enrolment restrictions, progression requirements, satisfactory progress, cross-institutional study and assessment criteria for the combined degree are equivalent to those for the BE degree and specialisations, as shown in the faculty handbook.

8. The Deans of the Faculties of Engineering and Information Technologies and Science shall jointly exercise authority in any matter concerning the combined degrees not otherwise dealt with in these resolutions.

This new (6 credit point) unit of study will be replacing two (3 credit point) units JAZZ3018 Jazz Transcription and Analysis 1 and JAZZ3019 Jazz Transcription and Analysis 2. The new six credit point unit is a synthesis of these two units and can now be taught in a concentrated manner across one semester.

**4. Transitional arrangements**

The old 3 credit point units will be phased out from 2010. The new 6 credit point course will be available to both old [BMus (Jazz) QH006] and new [BMus (Jazz) QH013] degree enrolments.

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**1. Name of award course**

Bachelor of Music (Jazz Performance)

**2. Purpose of proposal**

To advise the Undergraduate Studies Committee of changes to the BMus Jazz degree structure from 2010.

Jazz Improvisation is a large part of training within the Jazz Studies degree, and has always been an inclusive element of Principal Study. Current workload for jazz students in Principal Study is over 6 hours/week, this includes one-to-one lessons, concert practice, sectional tutorials and improvisation classes. In recognition of a more realistic student workload within these Principal Study units, the Faculty proposes to remove the 2 hour improvisation class from them and introduce a separate three-credit point Improvisation unit per semester as a co-requisite of Principal Study. This will also result in students being able to refer to more detailed results in their transcripts, and better management of teaching resources across the Faculty.
